
HERO ELEMENTARY RESEARCH BRIEF: EDUCATIONAL IMPACT



HERO ELEMENTARY IMPLEMENTS WITH 32 PARTNERS IN 22 STATES!

The Hero Elementary program has been steadily growing nationwide since its launch in 2019. Over 20 after-school programs, museums, and youth develop organizations have implemented the program. Using a Train-the-trainer model, we are reaching communities far and wide, including partnerships with the Beacons Network, Boys & Girls Club, Freedom Schools, YMCA, and many more!









EXTERNAL EVALUATORS STUDIED THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE FIRST COHORT OF HERO ELEMENTARY.*

Findings from the study indicated:

- The Hero Elementary program was implemented in small, medium, and large organizations, ranging from groups of 5 students to 50 students.
- Similarly, while some sites had one classroom of 20 students participating in the program, other sites served 250 students across multiple classrooms.
- Educators who implemented the program found it to be very engaging and navigable.
- The Hands-on Activities make the Hero Elementary program more robust by providing hands-on experiences outside of the digital platform that reinforce science learning and critical thinking.

The Hero Elementary program has also been implemented with afterschool organizations serving students with various disabilities. As the program was developed with principles from the Universal Design for Learning, educators have been able to adapt the program to meet the interests and needs of their children. With appropriate modifications, educators are able to successfully implement digital activities for students with various abilities.
